Eleven works from the library of Eleanor Marx Aveling. Boston, Geneva, Hamburg, Lille, London, Madrid, Milan and Zurich, 1871–1894. 8vo and 12mo. 11 vols., mostly in unsophisticated wrappers, stored loosely in contemporary green cloth covers (138 × 205 mm) and preserved within a green half morocco solander case.

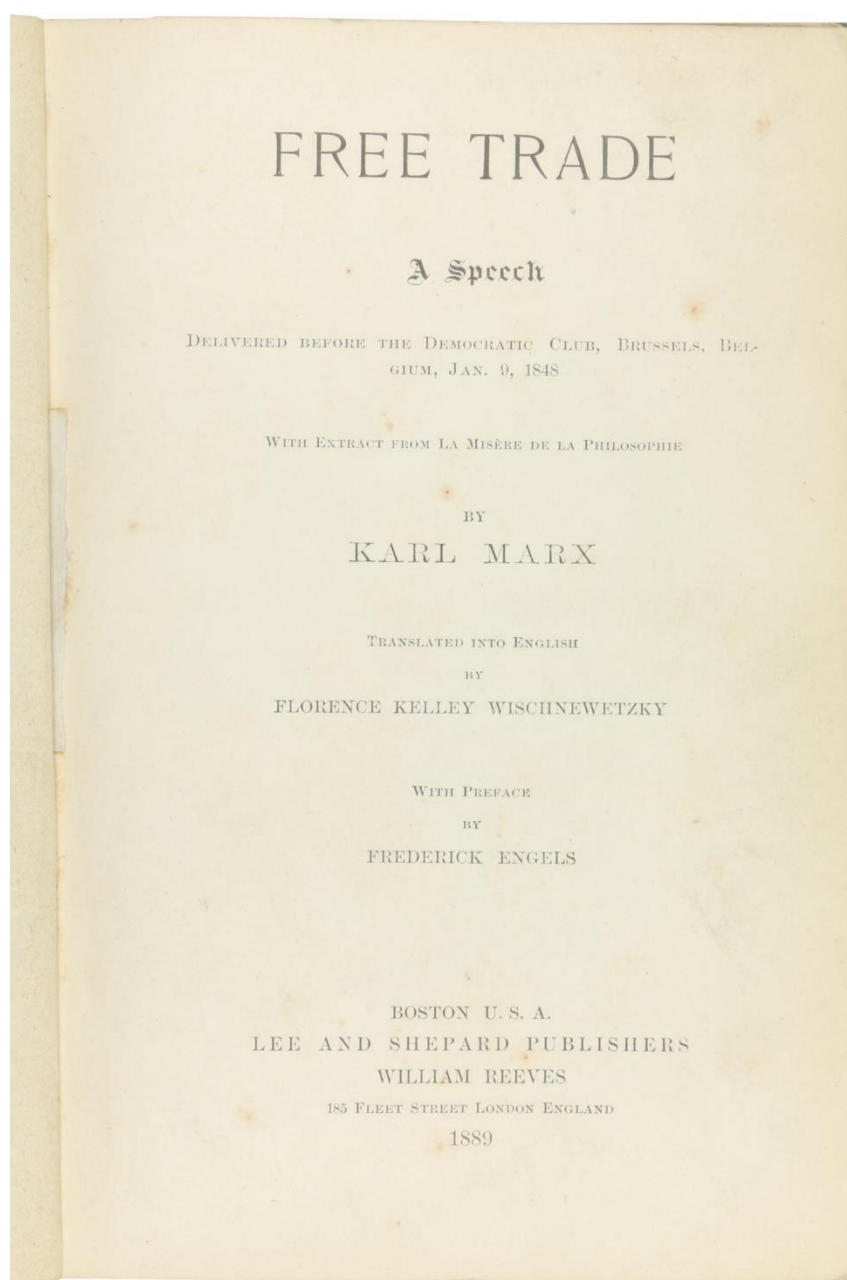
Unique collection of eleven early, extremely rare publications by Marx and Engels, including English, Italian and Polish translations of the Communist Manifesto, Russian and Spanish translations of “Misère de la philosophie”, as well as English and Italian editions of “Discours sur la question du libre échange”. From the personal collection of Karl Marx’s youngest daughter Eleanor (“Tussy”) Marx (1855–98), the companion of the socialist Edward Aveling. One of the works in this collection bears her autograph ownership on the title page, while three others are inscribed to her, one by Friedrich Engels. An outstanding ensemble.

First English-language edition (second issue, for British distribution) of Marx's brochure "Discours sur la question du libre échange", published in 1848 by the Association Démocratique de Bruxelles, of which Marx had been a vice president. An Italian translation, based on the present English one, would appear in 1894 (while a German translation had appeared as early as 1848). Engels contributed a new preface to the American edition which he submitted in German to the *Neue Zeit* (Stuttgart), who published it in 1888 (pp. 289-299). A few pencil underlinings to the preface; title and final leaf slightly browned and smudged.

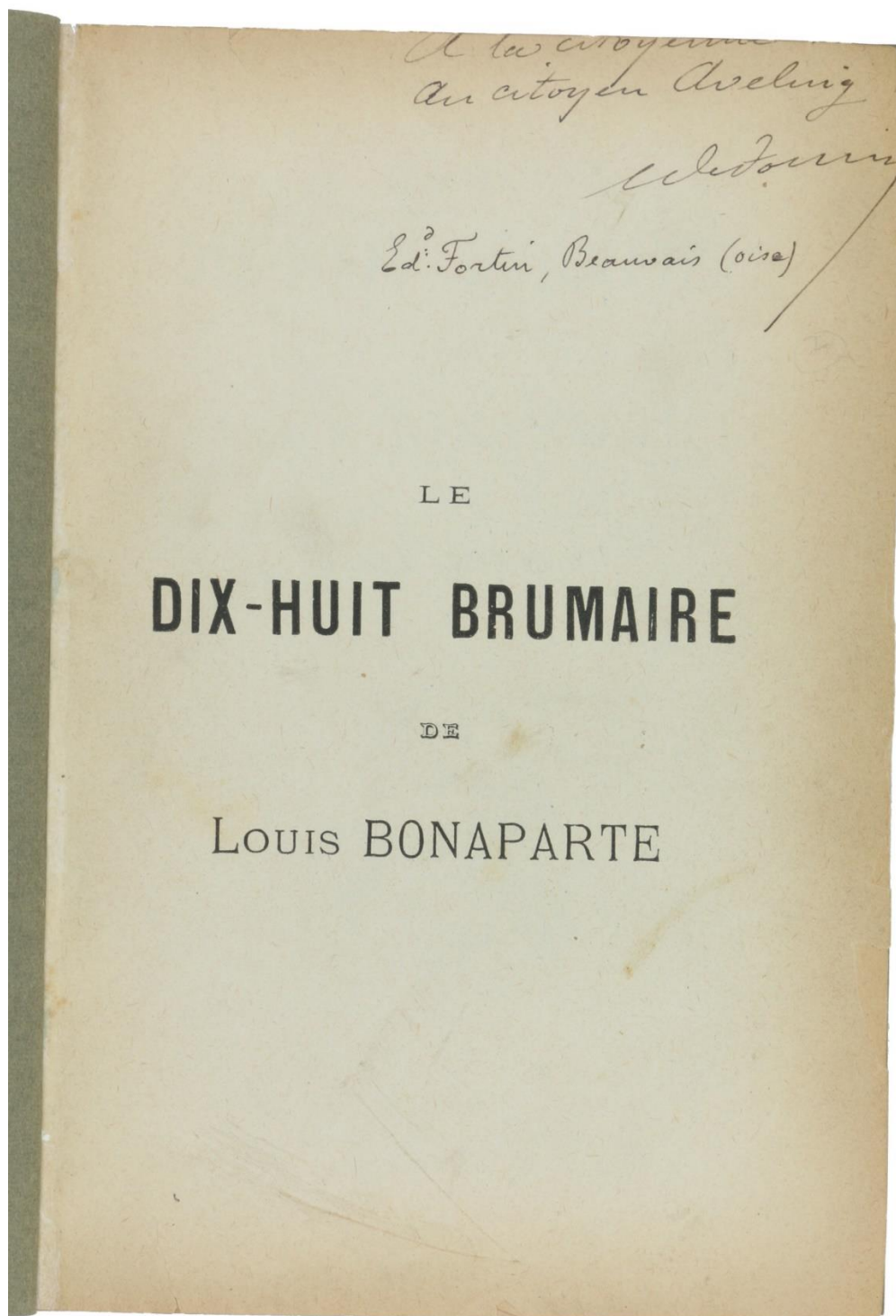

First French edition of Marx's 1852 essay. Translated by Édouard Fortin, inscribed in Beauvais (Oise) by the translator to Edward and Eleanor Marx-Aveling ("A la citoyenne et au citoyen Aveling"). Inscription slightly trimmed by binder's knife; edge defects to final leaves (slight loss to colophon).

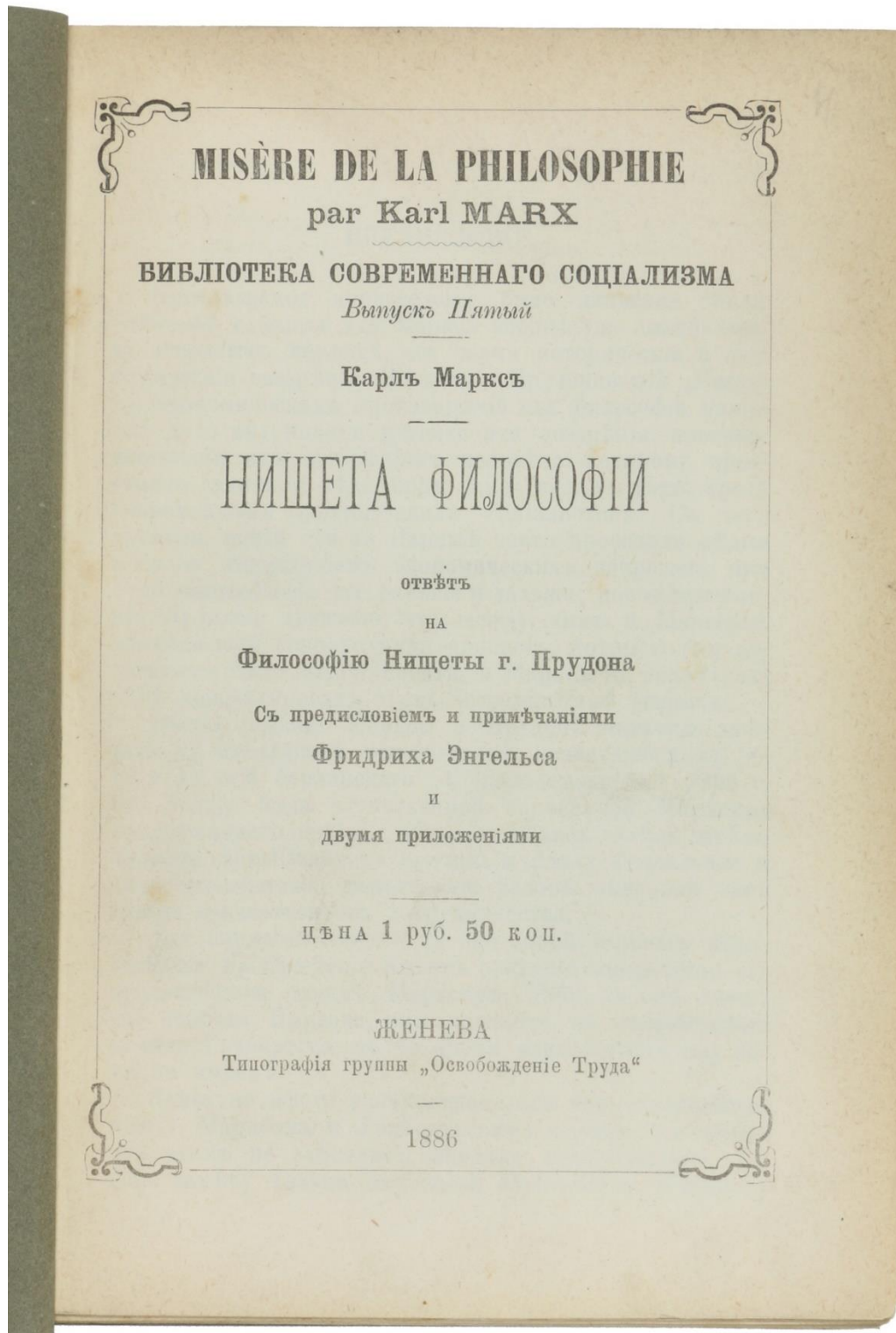

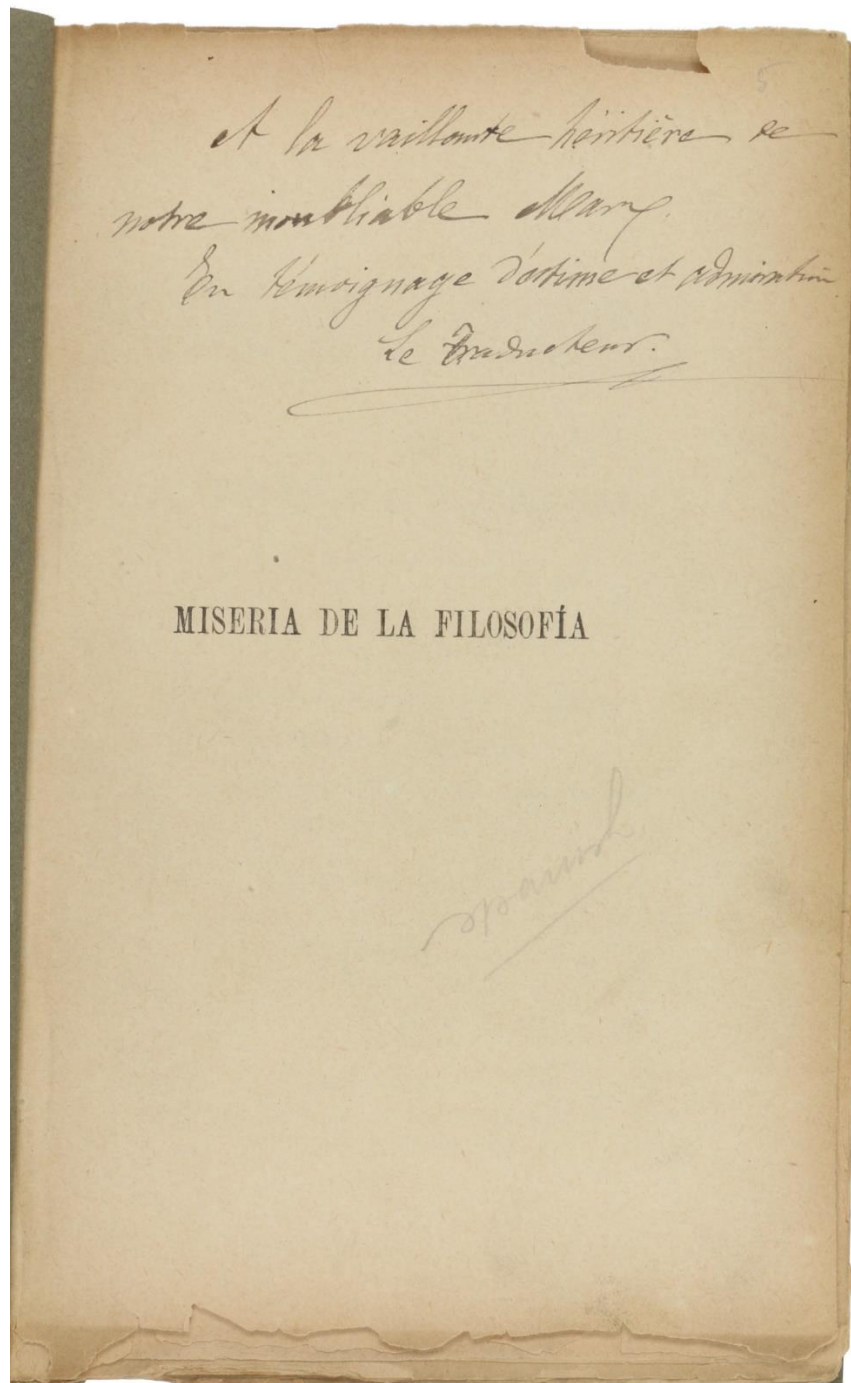

Extremely rare first Spanish edition of Marx's 1847 work, produced years before the first English (1900) and Italian (1901) translations. Uncut and untrimmed. Inscribed on the half-title by the translator, in French, to the author's daughter Eleanor Marx-Aveling: "A la vaillante héritière de notre inoubliable Marx. En témoignage d'estime et admiration / Le traducteur". A single copy in library catalogues internationally (Universitat Pompeu Fabra, Barcelona; that in the Bibliothek der Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung, Bonn, is a photocopy)

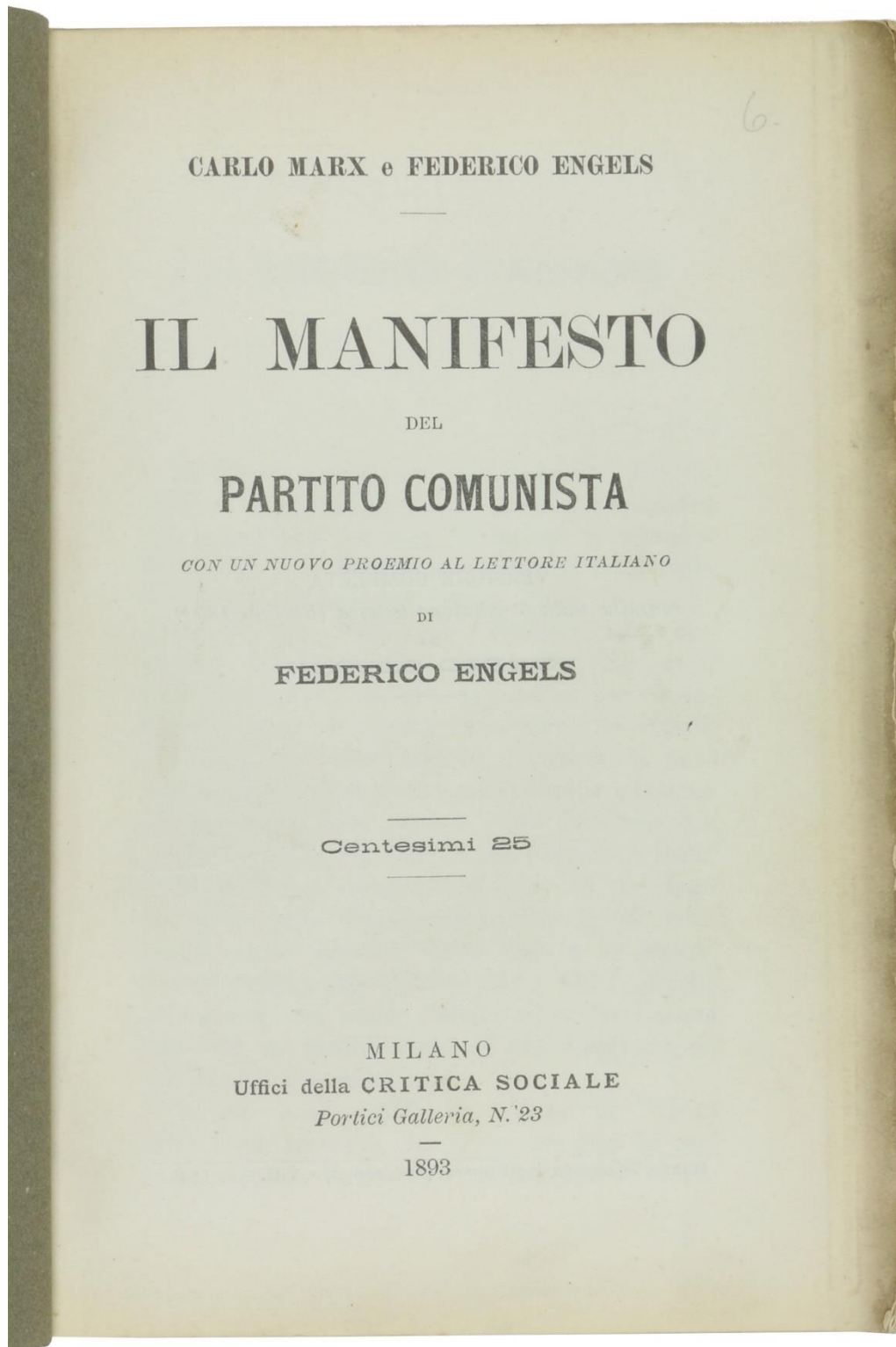

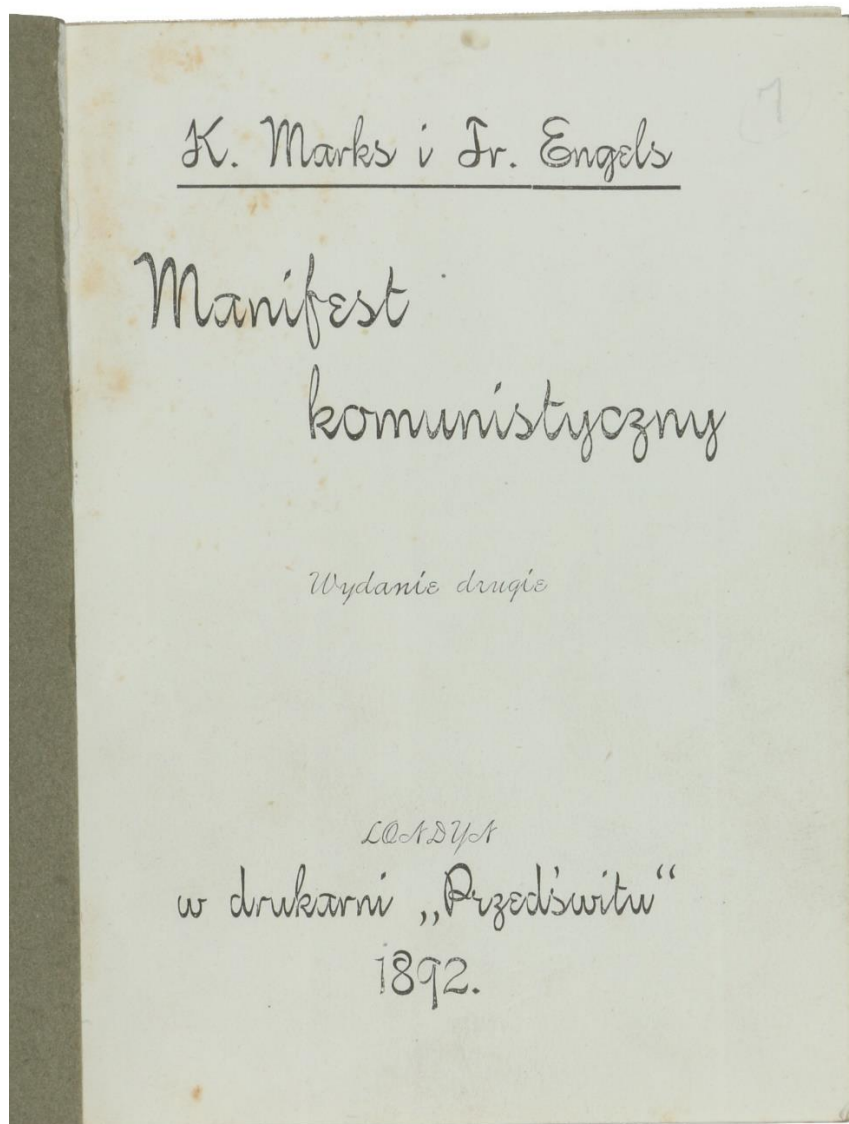

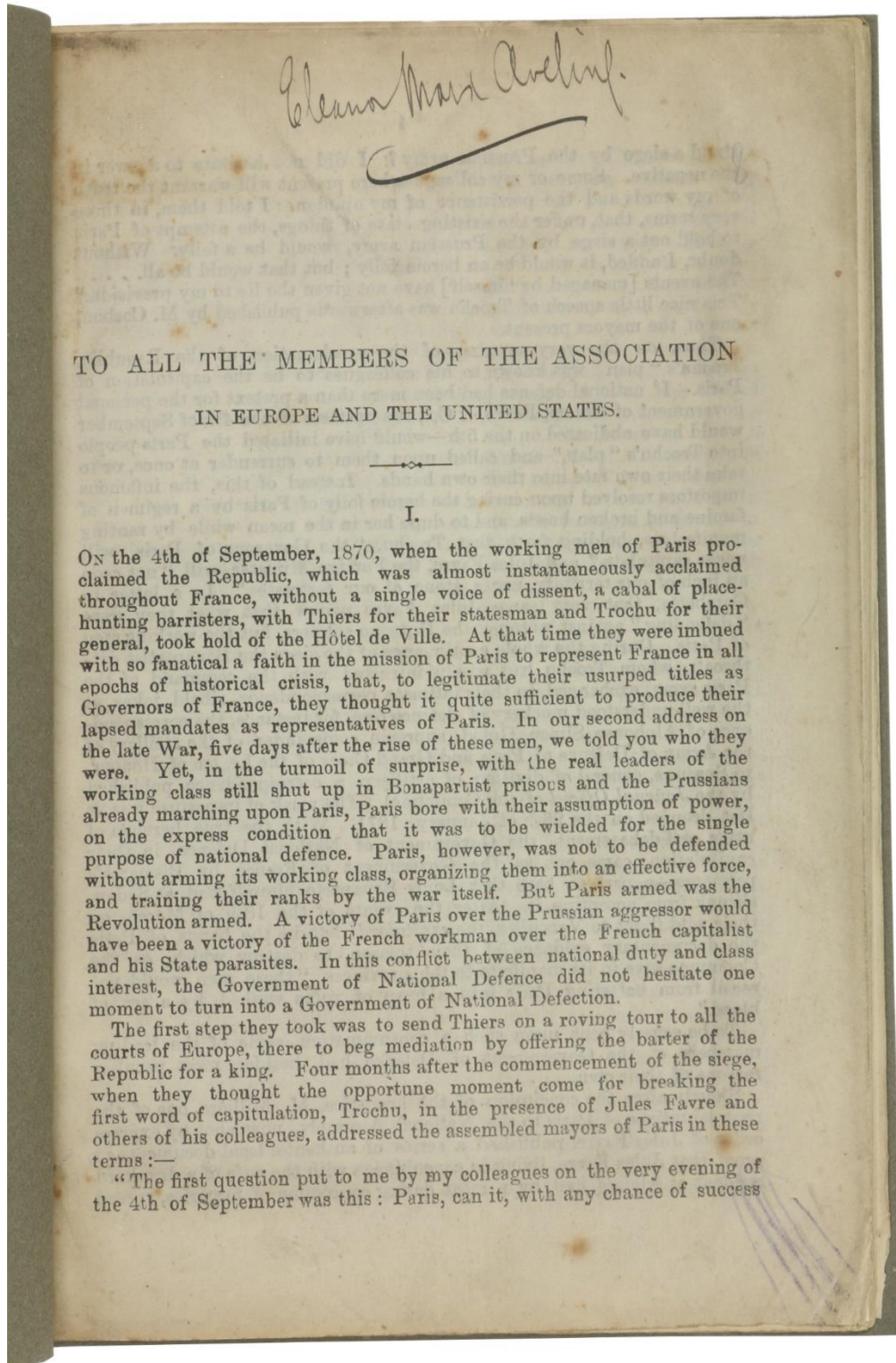

I.

On the 4th of September, 1870, when the working men of Paris proclaimed the Republic, which was almost instantaneously acclaimed throughout France, without a single voice of dissent, a cabal of place-hunting barristers, with Thiers for their statesman and Trochu for their general, took hold of the Hôtel de Ville. At that time they were imbued with so fanatical a faith in the mission of Paris to represent France in all epochs of historical crisis, that, to legitimate their usurped titles as Governors of France, they thought it quite sufficient to produce their lapsed mandates as representatives of Paris. In our second address on the late War, five days after the rise of these men, we told you who they were. Yet, in the turmoil of surprise, with the real leaders of the working class still shut up in Bonapartist prisons and the Prussians already marching upon Paris, Paris bore with their assumption of power, on the express condition that it was to be wielded for the single purpose of national defence. Paris, however, was not to be defended without arming its working class, organizing them into an effective force, and training their ranks by the war itself. But Paris armed was the Revolution armed. A victory of Paris over the Prussian aggressor would have been a victory of the French workman over the French capitalist and his State parasites. In this conflict between national duty and class interest, the Government of National Defence did not hesitate one moment to turn into a Government of National Defection.

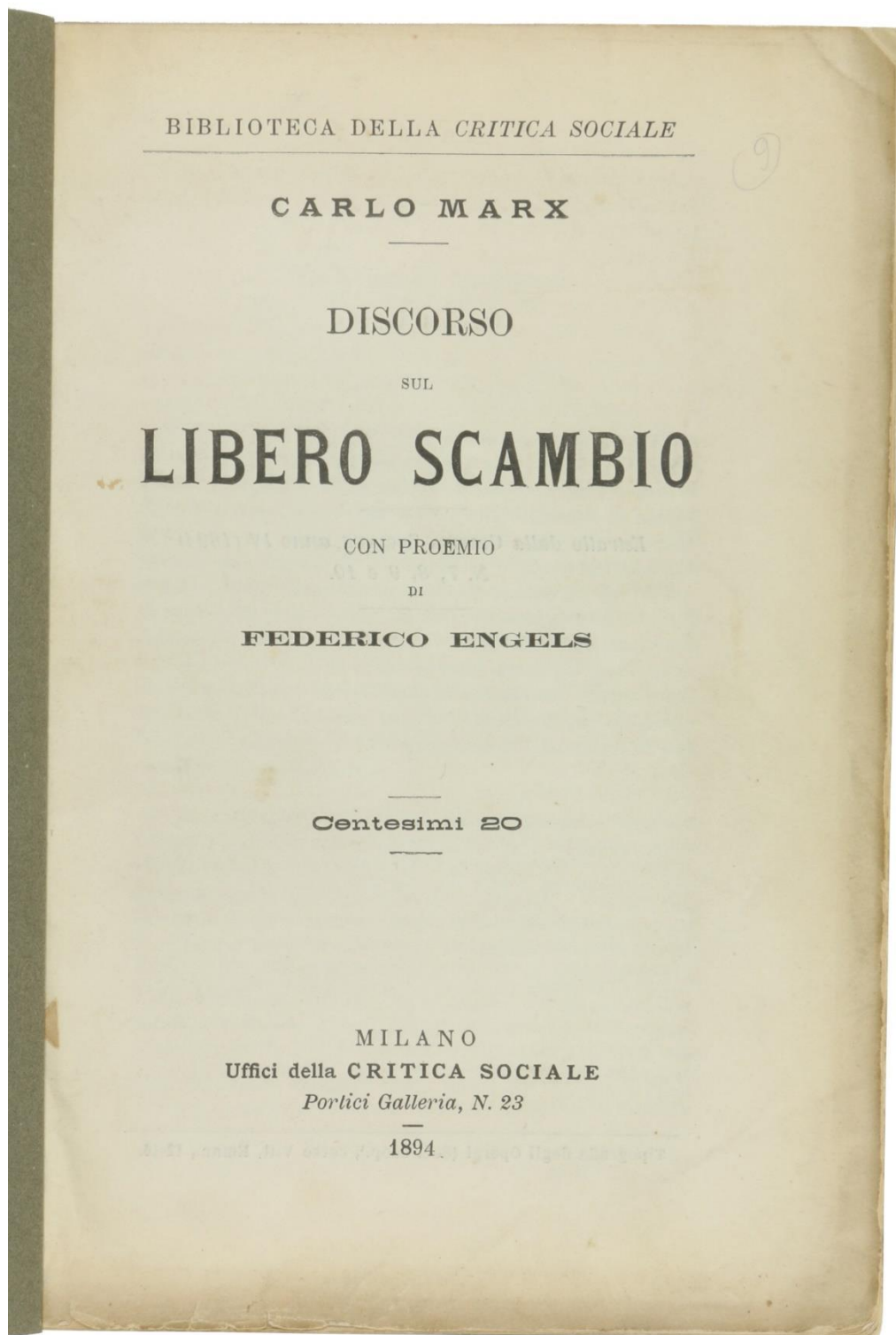
The first step they took was to send Thiers on a roving tour to all the courts of Europe, there to beg mediation by offering the barter of the Republic for a king. Four months after the commencement of the siege, when they thought the opportune moment come for breaking the first word of capitulation, Trochu, in the presence of Jules Favre and others of his colleagues, addressed the assembled mayors of Paris in these terms:—

“The first question put to me by my colleagues on the very evening of the 4th of September was this: Paris, can it, with any chance of success

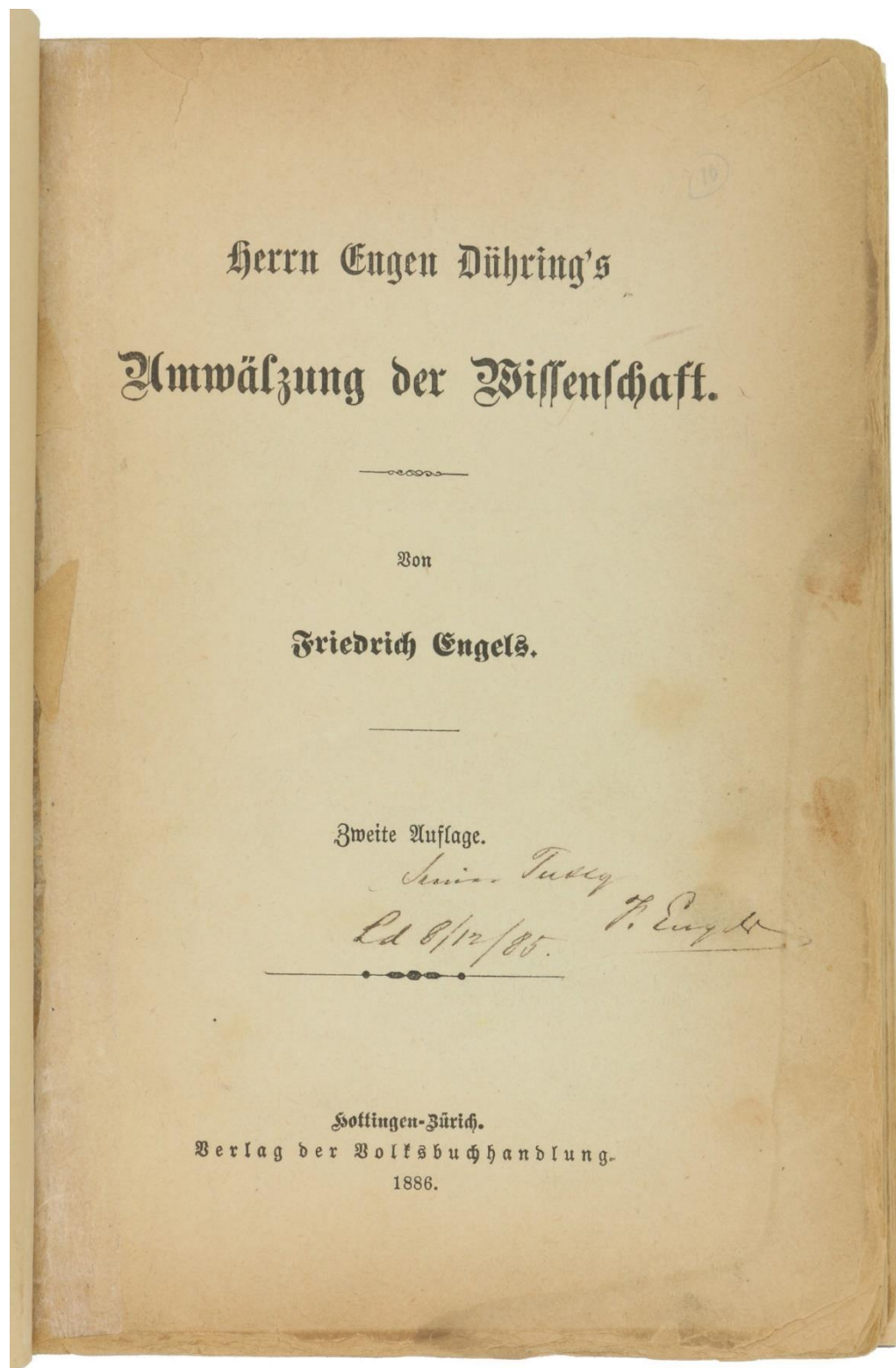
